Dear Parent/Guardian,

This year will be remembered in our lives for many reasons, none more so than for the 128,000 people who have sadly died due to Covid-19. As a school community our thoughts and prayers are with all the families who have suffered bereavement in losing loved ones due to the pandemic or whose families have been affected in any way.

For the last 18 months, we have all had to adjust to new routines and a different way of working in response to the pandemic. I am immensely proud of the students and staff who have worked exceptionally hard to ensure that we have continued to provide high quality education and support for our students. With all the changes we have had to put in place to keep our community safe, it has been great to have our school community back together since March 2021 and to see students enjoying their education and friendship groups, which are so important in providing social and emotional support.



I know that over the last 2 weeks we have some students self-isolating with Covid-19-related issues in different year groups. Unfortunately, this is symptomatic of the local and national situation we find ourselves in at the moment. However, yet again, I see on a daily basis how students have demonstrated the core values of the school (friendship, perseverance, respect, responsibility, compassion and wisdom) and holding these true has enabled our school community to continue to be united.

I would like to thank you all for the incredible efforts you have made in supporting your child this year. This has made a huge difference to the lives of the young people we proudly educate and strengthens the invaluable partnership between the school and home. Following the recent Government announcement, we are very much looking forward to returning to a normal school timetable and structure in September and reinstating some curricular and extra-curricular activities over time, which form an integral part of our wider educational provision. My letter to you on Tuesday 13 July outlines the planned changes for September 2021 subject to any other Government announcements.

I am delighted to be able to bring you a Parents' Newsletter this term, which gives you a snapshot of some of the activities and achievements outside of lessons students have embraced since March 2021 despite Covid-19 restrictions. Latest Government Covid-19 update as of 16 July 2021

Change to reporting Covid-19 cases and contact tracing from Monday 19 July 2021

The Government has informed schools that from Monday 19 July 2021, as we enter Step 4 of the roadmap, schools will no longer be responsible for contact tracing confirmed cases of Covid-19. Parents should contact NHS Test and Trace by phoning 111 to report a confirmed case. The NHS Test and Trace will now be identifying close contacts and not the school.

Please note that the school covid email address: covid@williamfarr.lincs.sch.uk closes at 4.00pm on Friday 16 July. Confirmed cases after this date should be reported to NHS Test and Trace.

Please can parents still inform the school of any term-time Covid-19-related student absence as requested by NHS Test and Trace by telephoning the normal sickness absence line on 01673 866900 (Option 1).

STUDENT SURVEY

It is important that William Farr receives feedback from students on their educational provision and support.

Over the last week, we have been conducting a student survey to find out how well students managed their learning during the second lockdown period (January - March 2021) and how they have settled back into school since we reopened in March 21. We are also very interested to ask students about how inclusive a school they think we are so that we can ensure everyone has equal opportunities and we avoid discrimination. All responses are anonymous. We will share the results of the student voice in September.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT NEWS

The English department has organised a number of extra-curricular activities for our Key Stage 3 classes this year.

We held virtual workshops with Sarah Oliver, a Sunday Times best-selling author, who has published over 20 children's books. The workshops coincided with the celebration of World Book Day on 4 March 2021 and Year 7 classes also had the opportunity to get involved in a virtual Q&A sessions with the author.

The footballer Marcus Rashford, along with co-writer Carl Anka, has recently published a book entitled, 'You Are a Champion: How to Be the Best You Can Be'. We were given the opportunity to access an interview where he talks about the book and the importance of reading in his life and this was shown to Year 7 in their Library Lessons. Following on from this, Year 7 students made their own videos about books they enjoy reading and these videos have been shared in Year 7 form time.

We have also continued to promote reading through our annual Book Buzz competition, where students in Year 7 get to choose a free reading book and then complete a task based on the story. There are 3 categories for the competition and this year's winners are: Holly Cant in the 'Model' category; Grace Burrin in the 'Creative Writing' Category; and Adam Calvert in the 'Book Review' category.

Our annual Readathon event has also continued. This will be our 17th year of running Readathon, where students are sponsored to read at least 6 books over several weeks and the money raised goes to a number of children's charities, including a hospital reading programme. To date, students have raised over £20,000 and the current Year 7 will be able to add even more to this fanatic sum when they hand in their sponsor money this term.

LINCOLN IMP

As part of the Lincoln Imp Trail, we were delighted to be loaned 'A Little Lucky' Imp for a few days back in May.

Designed by Caroline Greyling and sponsored by Chestnut Homes, the Imp was travelling round Lincolnshire before being placed on Exchequergate.

It will eventually be auctioned in Lincoln Minster with proceeds going to St Barnabas Hospice.

We hope this was a lucky charm for our Year 11 and 13 students.

GIBRALTAR POINT

In a world of post-pandemic interruptions, it was a pleasant surprise that the Year 12 Geography trip was allowed to continue to Gibraltar Point.

We felt very grateful and appreciative being the only trip to go ahead this year, especially after having spent so long persevering through online lessons.

The day commenced with a relatively undisturbed bus journey as we prepared for our morning of data collection. We were welcomed by Abby, a kind and enthusiastic member of the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust, and by a dry and pleasant breeze. Before even reaching the beach, we found ourselves identifying features on the coastal landscape and putting our hard work into practice. Our activities for the day included measuring biodiversity, wind speed, infiltration, temperature, and even map reading.

By lunchtime, the sun came out and coats were coming off. We then went on a walk around the beach, fuelled by cakes and vegan sausage rolls supplied by the local café. Such a hands-on experience allowed us to appreciate the landforms found at Gibraltar Point and see in real life the landscape that we have studied. We learned about how it is unique compared to other sand dune systems and how the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust aims to preserve the environment so that it can be visited by more people like us.

Overall, the trip provided us with an insight into the world of conservation and how one can effectively carry out fieldwork. It was an enjoyable and memorable day in the uncertainty of the current situation. We can only thank the Geography department for organising this trip and allowing us to explore Geography in a practical environment.

Students will start submitting their applications for university in the Autumn term.

SUCCESSES FROM YEAR 8

Year 8 has been having a very successful year.



Mya Dhokia is the British Tae Kwon Do champion. She continued to train and compete through all of the lockdowns we have had and she recently gained the title of British Champion.

Lola Bibby is going on a week's residential at King's College, London, as part of the NASA "Mission Discovery" STEM programme in the second to last week of this term and we wish her well with such an exciting opportunity.

Eva Rose Fellows has been accepted into Elmhurst Ballet School in association with Birmingham Royal Ballet and will be doing a week's summer school with them this year.

Charlie Bargh and Leanne Oborne were very successful in the Junior Maths Challenge and progressed to the Kangaroo round having been the only two Year 8s awarded a gold certificate. The Junior Kangaroo is a follow-on round to the Junior Mathematical Challenge. It is a 60-minute, multiple-choice challenge consisting of 25 problems and provides an additional opportunity for problem solving. Several thousand UK-based students are invited to take part in the Junior Kangaroo. Entry to the Challenge is by invitation only and is based on a qualifying score, which is variable from year to year.



YEAR 7 GET INTO THE CARNIVAL SPIRIT!

On Tuesday 22 June, all our Year 7s participated in a samba workshop courtesy of Lincolnshire Music Service and Louder than Life.

Samba is a type of music from Brazil and usually accompanies carnivals; it is loud and very rhythmic. Each group had an hour to learn a samba groove. The weather held, so they performed outside, no doubt giving the whole of Welton the samba experience! The children were so excited to see the different instruments: the surdo (bass drum), tamborim (hand drum), agogo (cowbell) and ganzá (rattle).

Tim (the workshop leader) started with a rhythm exercise to see how good their sense of pulse was. Who knew counting to four could be so difficult!! Tim then chose the groove (piece) depending on the group's ability. The students learnt the main groove, breaks, call and response sections, as well as how to move and play at the same time! Many children were given solo moments. We discovered some seriously groovy dancers and were very impressed by the focus of the children. It was a fantastic opportunity to develop new musical skills, learn a musical style from a different country and build on our community spirit as a year group. Our headteacher, Mr Knowler, said "I had the pleasure of observing the sessions, which were held outside due to Covid-19 restrictions. To see students fully engaged and thoroughly enjoying their first extra-curricular activity at secondary school was incredible. It was wonderful to see the school returning to a degree of normality we have not seen for the last 18 months". We are really looking forward to starting our extra-curricular programme again in September.



RESTORING MEMORIAL

Alesha Shaw, Isobel Surfleet, Amelia Murray and Eleanor-Rose Allibone from Year 12 have been restoring Reverend William Farr's memorial.

The headstone is situated in the graveyard of St Mary's Church in Welton. Reverend William Farr founded the school in 1952 and sadly passed away two years later. The girls spent time in their non-contact time and their Design and Technology lessons to sand down, carve and paint in the lettering and apply a varnish to give the memorial grave a new lease of life.





BIG BANG COMPETITION

Reuben Gidlow, our Arkwright scholar from Year 13, has entered his A-Level Design Engineering coursework project, an automated WiFi Lawn Mower, for a Big Bang competition.

The lawn mower was mainly 3D printed and run off an Arduino as the brain of the device. Reuben has been shortlisted in the Stantec and International Youth Science Forum special awards and we await news on the competition. To be shortlisted is achievement enough and we wish him all the best.

Reuben is due to start an undergraduate apprenticeship scheme with the Royal Navy as a weapons service engineer working on the Nuclear Vanguard and Astute Submarines.





ARKWRIGHT SCHOLARSHIP

It has been a very interesting year for all students and staff, but has also affected the process for the Arkwright Scholarship award.

This is a hugely prestigious award with only 250 students lucky enough to gain one in the country every year. The award itself is the prize, however it comes with £600 over the two years.
