#### Dear Parents/Guardians,

As we approach the end of what has been a busy and successful term, I would like to reflect on some key moments. In September 2023, we welcomed 248 Year 7 students into our school community from over 30 primary schools. I am very pleased with how they have settled in and made new friends as they start their educational journey with us. I was also delighted to see 128 Year 12 students joining us, including 17 external students from other schools - our highest number for many years.

It never ceases to amaze me, the number of students who volunteer to represent the William Farr community outside of school to 'engage in life it all its fullness' (John 10:10). As a Church school, I was delighted when a number of our students represented the school at the enthronement of Bishop Stephen at Lincoln Cathedral on 11 November. The service at St Peter's at Eastgate was a joy to be a part of, as was the procession to the Cathedral with Bishop Stephen. The enthronement service in the cathedral was awe-inspiring and it was a proud moment when William Farr students shook the hand of the Bishop, read a prayer, were listened to by a congregation of around a thousand, and joined in the celebration. Members of our Student Council also volunteered to represent the school at the Remembrance Service at Welton St Mary's Church on Saturday 11 November and many of our cadets joined the Remembrance Sunday parade with their respected regiments.



This term, the Senior Leadership Team has been working with the Governing Body to set the strategic direction for the school and agree the school priorities for the next few years. Further details can be seen in the Strategic Priorities pyramid included in this newsletter. As part of our priority to 'future-proof the school', we are very excited about our plans to develop the Sixth Form. Having secured government funding, a Sixth Form block will be built on the school site, next to the rear school car park, adjacent to the playing field. Providing plans go to schedule, the building should be ready for opening later in the Autumn Term 2024.

William Farr School has prided itself on achieving exceptional educational outcomes for students for many years. This term, the Department for Education confirmed that our Year 11 class of 2023 achieved a Progress 8 score of +0.52. This is the highest score the school has ever achieved since the inception of Progress 8 measures in 2016. It placed William Farr School in the top 10% of all Lincolnshire secondary schools (10/91) and 4th in the county for non-selective secondary schools, out-performing 9 of the 15 grammar schools in the county. This success was also mirrored at A Level. With a pass rate of 98.3%, William Farr celebrated its best-ever, pre-pandemic attainment since the A-Level reforms. More than a quarter of all grades awarded were A\* or A, with over half of all grades A\*- B. Over 90% of students received three or more offers from applications to university - the highest number in the last 10 years. Almost a third of students accepted places at Russell Group universities. This remarkable achievement is testimony to the students' hard work, commitment and resolve.

I was thrilled in November to hear that the school had been awarded the prestigious 'Prince's Teaching Institute Subject Programme Mark for Outstanding Teaching in English' for 2023 – an award which is proudly displayed on our website.

A special mention must go to the incredible support and unswerving commitment of staff, who work tirelessly to provide the very best for your child.

This newsletter provides a snapshot of some of the activities, events and achievements students have embraced outside of lessons, which play an integral part in students' learning experiences, helping them to acquire the knowledge, skills and understanding to support their academic and personal development.




### CODE OF CONDUCT

This is important so that everyone knows what is expected of them and can play their part. Teachers have led on an activity designed to support students' understanding of our expectations, both within lessons and outside of lessons.

### SCHOOL ATTENDANCE FIGURE AND TARGET

#### Current Attendance: 94.5% School Attendance Target: 96%

Good attendance is important because:

- Statistics show a direct link between under-achievement and absence;
- Regular attenders make better progress, both socially and academically;
- Regular attenders find school routines, school work and friendships easier to cope with;
- Regular attenders find learning more satisfying;
- Regular attenders are more successful in transferring from secondary school to higher education, employment and training.

#### Reminders:

- Every student has a target attendance of 100%;
- If your child is absent, please contact school before 8.30am for each day of absence on 01673 866900;
- Please ensure your child arrives to school between 8.30am-9.00am to ensure they are registered promptly;
- Any student with attendance below 90% attendance is classed as a 'Persistent Absentee';
- Please send your child to school if they have a minor illness, i.e. a bit of a headache, a bit of a sore throat;
- We are seeing an increase in the number of requests for term-time holidays, which cannot be authorised;
- Please monitor your child's attendance through the school's MCAS system.

### PUNCTUALITY

#### We are required to monitor student punctuality.

School starts promptly at 9.00am every day and students should be in their form room, seated and ready for registration. If students are not in registration at 9.00am, this is recorded as lateness.

Ongoing lateness, after the register has been taken, is classified as an unauthorised absence. We understand that there may be rare occasions when students are unavoidably late due to unforeseen circumstances. On these occasions, please make sure that you contact the school attendance office to inform us when your child will be late.

If you are experiencing difficulties with getting your child to school on time, please speak with your child's Head of Year or make an appointment with our Educational Welfare Officer, Mrs Chatterton.

### UNIFORM

#### Trainers and, in particular, black 'Air Force 1s' are not permitted in school.

There must be no logos or adornments of any kind. Please be aware of this if you are purchasing shoes.

#### BROMCOM

We are continuing to develop the use of our Management Information System, Bromcom. We are now using this system to track positive and negative behaviour events in school as we move away from paper-based systems. MCAS is already used to release information about your child's academic progress and attendance.

Parents can view positve rewards and homework issues via the MCAS app with further behaviour-related information to follow later in the academic year. When you log into MCAS, you will now see a new behaviour widget that will list the most recent behaviour events for your child.

MCAS will increasingly become the main source of information relating to your child's schooling. We encourage all parents to download and use the MCAS app. We will, of course, continue to liaise directly with parents over any behaviour concerns. #### NEW STUDENT WELLBEING CHAMPIONS

#### This new project is a collaboration between NHS Healthy Minds Lincolnshire and Lincolnshire schools.

We were approached by our Link Healthy Minds Practitioner, who asked if we, as a school, would like to sign up and participate in this important initiative to promote wellbeing peer support in school.

A student wellbeing champion is an individual who champions positive mental health and wellbeing in and around the school setting. The idea is that champions can help to break down the stigma attached to receiving support for emotional wellbeing issues, as well as help break down barriers that may affect this.

Student wellbeing champions are vital in creating a whole-school approach to wellbeing, as well as helping peers to access the support that they need. They receive training from Healthy Minds throughout the academic year. They understand that their role as a Wellbeing Champion is not to be a therapist, but to signpost the student to any adult within the school setting for help.

Students completed a detailed application form, signed by a parent, and then they were interviewed by three members of staff, before being offered the role.

We were overwhelmed by the response and quality of the applicants; the successful ones are now in post and supporting their peers around school.

We have another layer of peer support in our school with the role of Student Wellbeing Advocates, who also support positive Mental Wellbeing in school.



### ATTITUDE TO LEARNING AWARDS

#### Data Point Reports were released this term, giving detail on how students have started this academic year.

We have placed a significant emphasis on attitude to learning, with grades being achieved in the following categories for Years 7-11:

- Behaviour
- Effort
- Ready for Learning
- Homework
- Presentation

Our Sixth Form students have their own categories reflecting the skills and attributes they will require as they progress into wider society. Reporting on this is valuable as having a positive attitude to learning leads to academic progress and future success. In order to ensure our students are known and valued, we are awarding certificates, badges, letters home and gift vouchers on a termly basis to a selection of students who always demonstrate a positive attitude in all their subjects. Autumn Term awards will be presented in January.



### BISHOP'S ENTHRONEMENT

#### On Saturday 11 November at Lincoln Cathedral, the Rt Revd Stephen Conway was enthroned as the 73rd Bishop of Lincoln.

More than 1,000 people attended the service, including civic dignitaries, clergy, readers, ministers, parishioners and other church officers from the Diocese of Lincoln, bishops, representatives of ecumenical and interfaith groups, and members of the public. Three of our amazing Year 7 students (Layla Edlington, Olivia Clark and Abbie Berry) were a real credit, representing William Farr at the enthronement. We were also joined by pupils of Welton St Mary's Primary School.



# THE BIG DRAW AT LINCOLN UNIVERSITY

# On Monday 6 November, a group of 15 Year 12 and 13 students from Art, Graphics and Photography travelled to the University of Lincoln to take part in this year's Big Draw event.

The Big Draw is a pioneering visual literacy charity dedicated to raising the profile of drawing as a tool for wellbeing, thought, creativity, social and cultural engagement. The charity leads a diverse programme of advocacy, empowerment and engagement, and is the founder and driving force behind The Big Draw Festival – the world's biggest celebration of drawing. The event at the University of Lincoln was organised by Brian Voce, a senior lecturer in Graphis Design. The students participated in two workshops, 'Sand and sound vibration drawing' and 'Poetry Illustration'. The students were engaged and really benefited from talking to the staff and using the facilities at the University. This is the second year we have taken part and, hopefully, we will make this an annual event.







#### **REMEMBRANCE DAY**

### The Poppy Collection for the Royal British Legion raised £308.22 this year.

On 11 November 2023, we were invited to take part in the Remembrance Day service at Welton St Mary's Church to honour those who fought and died in past wars for our country. It was a real privilege to be given the opportunity to represent the school at such an important event, especially one which has such significant links to the village of Welton and the school.

A large crowd gathered outside the Church for the service, which included war veterans and members of the public. We met the vicars who were conducting the service and had the opportunity to take photographs to remember the event. At 11am, we all stood in silence to mark the occasion and then read out our poems in front of the Welton community: In Flanders Field by John McCrae and The Crosses by Bill Mitton. Poppy wreaths were laid on the war memorial. Following the service , 'The Last Post' rang out through the street and we bowed our heads in remembrance. It was an honour to be part of such an important event and one we will always remember.

- GCSE / A Level Progress 8 results: achievement of the best Progress 8 results (the improvements students have made during their learning at school) ever seen at William Farr School.

### CAREERS AT WILLIAM FARR

### Since the last careers update, we have had a range of exciting activities and events based around career development and "Future Me" opportunities.

At the end of the summer term, Year 10 had Take Your Child To Work Day. Around 190 students went out on placements with family members and friends, and destinations included primary schools, care homes, farms, restaurants, Stagecoach, the hospital, RAF and Police HQ, among many others. We had just over 40 students in school, who undertook workshops on transferable skills and confidence building with an external company called Bright Futures. Take Your Child To Work for Year 10 this year is already booked for Wednesday 10 July 2024, and parents can expect more information closer to the time.

In the summer, our Year 11 leavers successfully secured places at the destination of their choice, with around 45% coming to our Sixth Form and the rest going to a variety of different destinations. The majority go to our local Further Education colleges, Lincoln and Riseholme, with whom we have strong links, but we also had students move on to specialist colleges (for the Performing Arts or Fashion) and apprenticeships. About 70-75% of our Year 13 students go on to university, but last year we also had students secure highly competitive Higher or Degree Apprenticeships and others who took up exciting training opportunities with local employers.

The Autumn Term has seen the launch of our Year 12 work experience programme. This is a hybrid offer, meaning that students can choose face-to-face or virtual work experience, which they can complete at any time of the year. We also held our Post-16 Information Morning for Year 11, where students were reminded of their options for next year and heard talks from Lincoln and Riseholme Colleges, as well as ASK Apprenticeships, Access Creative College, the Air and Space Institute at Newark, the NHS, MCPT (Military College) and Inspire + (Sports courses), as well as an option for those students considering a career in Medicine, Veterinary Science or Dentistry, as these students need to consider their A Level choices carefully.

We are also holding a series of assemblies for all year groups, to start even younger students thinking about their future early. In addition, we aim to link learning to future careers as often as possible and this term we have been focusing on careers linked to Religious Studies, Business Studies and Geography.

### ARKWRIGHT SCHOLARSHIP

### During the first half term, we were really pleased to receive the news that Kai Lynn (Y12) had been successful in being awarded an Arkwright Scholarship.

The Smallpeice Trust's Arkwright Scholarship Award is a highly regarded engineering scholarship and he joins 327 others in passing the application process this year.

Scholars are selected for their potential as future engineering leaders by assessing their academic, practical and leadership skills in STEM – Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. These are gauged through a rigorous selection process comprising of an assessed application form, including the school's reference; a two-hour, problem-solving aptitude exam; and a university-based interview.

The scholarships support students through their Sixth Form studies and encourage them into top universities or higher apprenticeships. The scholarships consist of an annual financial award to each scholar and enrichment activities, such as mentoring and industry visits that enhance a scholar's experience of engineering in a real-world context.

Arkwright Engineering Scholarships are highly regarded by university admission tutors and industry recruiters and are one of the most prestigious accolades that a talented Sixth Form student can receive.

# Y7 OPERA WORKSHOP

#### In November, the school hosted a workshop delivered by London Festival Opera for Y7, and Y6 pupils from St. Mary's Primary School also came along to join our Year 7s.

The four singers, Soprano, Alto, Tenor and Bass, had travelled from London and Glasgow to be with us and took the children through the different voices and styles found in opera. The workshop was absolutely fabulous. The quality of singing was phenomenal, "jaw-dropping" (Y7), and heightened by the acting abilities of the participants. All were completely entranced by the experience and wanted to be part of it, as was evidenced by the number of children who had their hands up every time a volunteer was required!! # The Christmas Concert this year demonstrated the breadth and diversity of music within our school.

The ensemble items also added to this, showing progression through the school with 'Mini-band', which had a majority of Year 7 students, through to Orchestra, which is predominately Years 11-13.
