### SIXTH FORM

# Thank you for attending the Sixth Form Information Evening on 30 October.

The evening was busy and very well attended. It was lovely to see so many of our Year 11 students finding out more about Post-16 life at William Farr.

Year 11 students enjoyed a further session on Sixth Form as part of their Post-16 Morning held on 5 November where they had the opportunity to question our current Sixth Form students and gain a greater understanding of the day-to-day reality of studying A-level subjects.

### ART AND DT TRIP TO BARCELONA

On the Wednesday before October half term, 30 Art, Design Engineering, Graphics, Fashion and Textiles, Photography and Product Design students (and 4 staff) climbed aboard a coach destined for East Midlands Airport.

Within hours we were stood on Las Ramblas in the heart of Barcelona and we were blessed with the weather. Uncle William was looking down on us!

Every day was planned with educational activities, as well as being jam-packed with culture. Students visited the Picasso, Science and Technology, Miro and Design museums, as well as the Sagrada Família, a nearly 100-year-old cathedral once started by Gaudi himself and now finished by architects and artists in his style, which was awe-inspiring.

Students also visited Gaudi's Parc Guell and Gaudi's house; Casa Mila. We also climbed Parc de Montjuic, flew across Barcelona on the cable car and watched the famous Font Magica, which was great to see – so good we watched it twice. As a treat students also visited PortAventura World.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the study tour, even though the prime reason for going was to gain inspiration and source materials for project work. Students arrived back late on Monday, ready for a well-earned rest, having totted up nearly 80 miles and cemented friendships, made new friends and even learned some Spanish along the way! We will always have Barcelona.





## **MOROCCO VISIT**

Earlier this year, William Farr was proud to send Mr Wilcock to Agadir, Morocco, as part of the 'Global Pathways: Connecting Classrooms' initiative organised by the British Council.

The intention behind the trip, which took place over the October half term, was to raise awareness of climate issues and how these topics can be tackled within the classroom environment.

As well as gaining an insight into Moroccan history and culture through trips to the cities of Agadir and Marrakesh, the trip consisted of visits to multiple schools and education centres in order to expand British visitors' understanding of the Moroccan education system. One of these schools was Mohamed Derfoufi, which offered British visitors an insight into the creative and passionate approach that students had towards climate change and its impact on our planet. Students presented a range of work, from music and drama performances, to artwork and upcycled products.

Mr Wilcock also visited Ibn Sina High School in the Biougra region of Morocco, in order to explore how our partner school had incorporated climate change issues into the classroom. This was also an opportunity for Mr Wilcock to present a letter of reply from Mr Knowler to Mr Ahmed Ouajine, the Headteacher of Ibn Sina, who wrote to Mr Knowler when William Farr School was honoured to host Moroccan visitors earlier this year.

Finally, Mr Wilcock, in conjunction with the other British visitors who had travelled from Lincolnshire schools, was asked to deliver a workshop, which focused on 'Good Teaching and Learning Practices' to prospective teachers who were studying Education at an undergraduate level.

As a part of the 'Global Pathways: Connecting Classrooms' initiative, Mr Wilcock has already helped to incorporate aspects of climate awareness into English lessons, but is launching new concepts at the start of 2020 that will help to raise awareness of this critical issue and encourage students to be more eco-conscious, as well as expanding their understanding of other cultures.



### REMEMBRANCE DAY

The Poppy Collection for the Royal British Legion raised £418.21 this year.

As well as selling poppies in the school, the cadets from the RAF, Army and Royal Marines, along with representatives from our School Council, attended the Remembrance Day Service at St Mary's Church, Welton.

They laid two wreaths from the school and took part in the minute's silence.



### YEAR 8 LAUNCH INTO SPACE

Life can throw some difficult decisions at Year 8 now and again and today was no exception. On arrival at the International Space Centre, Leicester, there were many questions that were very hard to answer – one of them being, which activity to do first?

- o Take a trip on the launch rocket, Thor, and head up out of the Earth's atmosphere?

# PRESTIGIOUS NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED TO YOUNG ENGINEERS

More than 400 of the country's most talented students have been honoured at ceremonies in London and Edinburgh as they received scholarships from one of the UK's leading engineering programmes.

Reuben Gidlow and Tom Carter in Year 12 were among students hand-picked from across England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland who have achieved a coveted Arkwright Engineering Scholarship award.

A total of 415 scholars will receive financial and mentoring support through their A-Levels and Scottish Advanced Higher qualifications, as part of a drive to inspire future leaders in engineering.

The Arkwright Engineering Scholarship is a programme from national STEM education charity The Smallpeice Trust, which has been providing scholarships to students since 1991.

Since its inception, more than 5,700 young people have passed through the scholarship programme, including award-winning BBC presenter Steph McGovern, who forged a career at Black & Decker before moving into business journalism. This year, more than 1,370 students aged between 15 and 16 years old applied, following nominations from their schools. Scholarships were awarded to 126 female students, representing 30% of all 2019 Arkwright scholars.

The successful applicants, who have all undertaken a rigorous, year-long application process, were invited to receive their accolade at ceremonies held at the Institute of Engineering and Technology in London and the International Conference Centre in Edinburgh. The scholarships consist of an annual financial award to each scholar and to his/her school, and enrichment activities such as mentoring and industry visits that enhance a scholar's experience of engineering in a real-world context.



## NEWS FROM THE GOVERNORS

The first term of the new school year is always a busy one for Governors, with several Full Governing Body meetings and at least one meeting each for all the committees: Admissions, Resources, Ethos and Relationships and Quality of Education.

We started the term reviewing the excellent results gained by last year's Year 11 and 13 and then started to look at our priorities for the coming year to maintain the fantastic standards that we all associate with William Farr.

We also have a responsibility to review and agree various school policies. This term this has included the Admissions Policy for September 2021, the Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy and the Sex and Relationships Policy, as well as a new Parental Code of Conduct Policy.

As I mentioned in my last newsletter item, we also discussed the need for some new Parent Governors on the Governing Body and we have agreed that we would like to have up to 5 parents on the Governing Body (we currently have 2 in that role).

We will be holding an election (if it is needed given the numbers who apply) in February 2020 for Parent Governors and we will be holding an information evening for anybody who would be interested on Monday 27 January 2020 at 6pm, which is our usual meeting time/day of the week. More details on this event will follow in the new year in the form of a letter/email from school, so please look out for it if you have an interest in the role.

Over 70 students took part in our Christmas Concert this year and the audience left with a sense of awe and wonder! The concert got off to a superb start with the orchestra, who delighted with a medley of 'Phantom of the Opera' tunes and a performance of 'Sleigh Ride', complete with whip and sleigh bells! Our Year 13 students gave the audience a taster of the calibre of their A-level recitals and the KS3 students were equally impressive, demonstrating a level of professionalism rarely seen at this age. The Year 10 and 11 pupils particularly wowed with the range and quality of their performances, including a piece of Electro House composed and performed by William Kerridge.

The second half was packed full of Christmas music and got off to a great start with the newly formed 'Cathedral Belles', a vocal group of cathedral choristers and ex-choristers, singing 'Cathedral Bells'! It's never really Christmas until you hear a performance of George Michael's 'Last Christmas' and Scarlett (Y10) and Chase (Y7) delivered on this. It has also become a Will Farr tradition for there to be a duet between Oliver Altoft and Imogen Grover and they did not disappoint, singing Buble's arrangement of 'White Christmas' to rapturous applause! The choir was the best (and biggest!) it had ever been, singing Pentatonix's 'White Winter Hymnal', complete with body percussion and Rutter's 'Very Best Time of Year' to complete what was a fantastic evening.

A special mention goes to Ethan Windle, who was hugely in demand throughout the concert, not only as a soloist, but also an accompanist for other pupils, including performing the famous glockenspiel solo in 'Last Christmas'. A huge thank you to all those who took part and those behind the scenes, including the India Expedition team, led by Miss Simons, and to the Music department, led by Mrs Prentice, who made such a wonderful occasion possible. And as I think about Jesus, God's gift, so I realise that by trying to do as he did, and to love other people in God's name. I might begin to make the world a better place.


