How is it taught?

Character education is all-encompassing and is uniquely threaded through all areas of curriculum and personal development opportunities that the students receive. We take character education seriously as we believe it is fundamental to the development of our students. Character education is taught mainly through our PSHE programme. Termly themes are embedded through assemblies, displays and other activities around the school. Subject areas take responsibility for further developing opportunities to discuss virtues and virtue based dilemmas, whilst the opportunities for students to put their "character" into practise are wide-ranging: extra-curricular clubs including music and drama productions, activities, trips and events, volunteering and charity work. Despite all the opportunities that are seized to teach character, both explicitly and implicitly, we believe that the modelling of character is a crucial aspect and to this end, we work with staff and parents/carers on character and character virtues. It is important that staff model good character behaviours and engage in positive character language with students.
